Volunteer Effort Continues in Washington Park

The volunteer effort in Washington Park continues to increase. Our regular volunteer group “Friends of Washington Park” has been very busy with several projects from the boardwalk to the playground and everywhere in between. Our group held the first annual “Split for the Park” event in May. This event provided volunteers and neighbors a list of plants they could split from their own gardens and donate. The response was outstanding with over 70 plants donated. The rest of the plants were purchased at a local nursery with funds raised through Memorial Brick sales, other donations, and our first place gift certificate from last year’s Springfield in Bloom contest. Thanks to this very dedicated group of volunteers, the three main planting beds at the playground were cleaned up and over 125 donated and purchased plants were split with over 350 plants planted. Mulch donated by Chapman Stone finished out the project. All this was accomplished in just a little over three hours. WOW!!!!!!! In total, the Friends of Washington Park volunteer group and the Springfield Parks Foundation contributed approximately \$1800.00 in plants and materials to the Park District. The project placed second in this year’s Springfield in Bloom contest. The volunteers were also responsible for planting the entrance sign areas throughout the park along with the flowers around the band shelter. Of course, none of this would be possible without the support of individuals like Chuck Smith, Chad Scaife and their staffs at the Springfield Park District.

Several other coordinated volunteer efforts also took place within the park. A hard working group of interns from the Illinois EPA spent the day near the old Iron Spring continuing our effort to restore the wooded areas to their natural form. This was made possible through the collaborated effort of the Park District and Friends of Washington Park. Another wonderful group of volunteers were the members of Delta Church who committed to volunteering



1 day a month for 3 straight months. They would hold their Sunday service in the main picnic shelter followed by their volunteer work and then lunch. They were able to mulch most of the main walking trails within the woods along with cleaning up and weeding the playground area. It was truly a pleasure meeting and working with this group. It goes without saying that without passionate, dedicated park patrons like these volunteers and contributors, projects like these would not be possible. The Friends of Washington Park volunteers have been supporting efforts within the park for over two years now. Sprucing up Lincoln Park

Friends of Lincoln Park and the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Association banded together this year to help spruce up parts of Lincoln Park. Through work days, several volunteers set out to clear the volunteer trees, weeds, brush and poison ivy away from the beautiful waterfall nestled into the side of the hill next to Lincoln Park's lagoon. Lincoln Park Lagoon

The final phase for the Lincoln Park Lagoon started this fall. The area to the south of the bridge, affectionately called the amphitheater, is getting re-graded and proper drainage will be installed to reduce the erosion currently affecting the lagoon area. Once this is complete, the areas with rotting railroad ties will be replaced with landscape brick to match the stone of the bridge. The walkways around the lagoon will be restored as will the beautiful stone work that has fallen into the lagoon along the edge. The memorial bricks will be placed to the north of the bridge with the decorative lighting and benches strategically installed around the lagoon. Evans-Mason is the contractor for this final phase and will work as weather permits. We are confident the area will be pristine by the May 2010 dedication. Sensory Gardens at Southwind Park

One of the many features that will make Southwind Park so unique is the five sensory gardens. These gardens have been a work in progress over the last two years. The design team met with many different community organizations over a six month period to survey how the sensory gardens could be used to meet the user's needs. The gardens have been funded by a grant provided by the National Recreation Foundation and two private donations.

The Enabling Garden is designed to give special needs individuals the opportunity to garden with raised planters that allow for gardening from a chair.

The Tranquility Garden is developed for people who have Alzheimer's or dementia. It includes a grove of 22 white birches, low lighting & five different seating areas promoting a peaceful setting.

The Fragrant Garden provides park visitors the opportunity to interact with plants up close. The focal point of this garden will be a waterfall that cascades through the wall and empties into a reflecting pool.

The Children's Garden has a variety of fun plants that include a vegetable garden for children to plant and harvest, a mini butterfly garden, a native plant area, a bird attracting garden, and many different paths and whimsical items to interact with while playing throughout the garden.

The Butterfly Garden was designed with the Illinois State Museum staff. The two types of plants and trees in this garden attract butterflies or support the

caterpillars' habitat requirements. There will be interpretive signage, seating areas, and a water feature to enjoy.

Over 3,000 flowers and ornamental grasses that will be planted in these gardens have been planted and maintained weekly by students from The Hope Institute. This summer, twenty students from the Opportunity GreenWorks and YouthBuild programs, both sponsored by the Springfield Urban League, assisted with the construction and planting of these gardens. Senior Services of Central Illinois' RSVP volunteers have been busy planting over 1,000 of these perennials and ornamental grasses the last few Wednesday mornings. Youth from Chatham Presbyterian and St. Elmo's First Church of God have mulched trees and helped with weeding. Groups from the University of Illinois at Springfield have helped plant trees. Students and faculty from the Capital Area Career Center assisted in pouring concrete as well as miscellaneous greenhouse upkeep. As you can see, our gardens have been nurtured by many volunteers from throughout our community. We look forward to continued stewardship and progress through volunteerism.

We REALLY are progressing with building Southwind Park

Our unique 80 acre state of the art park will serve as a national model providing a new dimension of inclusion for all people "without boundaries."

Beyond full compliance with the American Disabilities Act, special emphasis and attention has been given to individuals

with physical and cognitive needs. The park also supports several sustainable designs including natural habitat areas, bio swales and rain gardens. In addition, a wind energy integration system,

photovoltaic applications and recycled materials are also targeted to be included in the overall design of the park features.

The first building in the park, "Erin's Pavilion", will serve as an informational center as well as a building to facilitate recreational, interpretive and educational programs, services and special events. The pavilion design has a focus on sustainable energy, demonstrating our commitment to environmentally sound methods of energy production. Erin's Pavilion certification

goal is to achieve LEED platinum utilizing renewable and sustainable resources. LEED Platinum certification is the highest level

of certification of which only 80 buildings have achieved under the New Construction rating system WORLD WIDE.

Progress:

With an unusual wet spring/summer, our park construction schedule was delayed. BUT the work continues and our opening date for the park is Spring 2010. Delays are disappointing; however, the wait in time will provide rewards! The plants will be larger and in full bloom, the grass will be greener and our park guests will be eager to have a pleasurable experience. Southwind Park will be ready for everyone to come and spend time enjoying the outdoors.

What you will enjoy when you visit this Spring...

- Erin's Pavilion offers stunning panoramic views of the lake and amphitheatre hillside. Serving as the nucleus of park-wide activity and information, Erin's Pavilion also has several large and small rooms for programs, rentals and special events.
- Six picnic shelters equipped with lights, ceiling fan and nearby grill.
- Bocce Ball & shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pits and life size chess game
- Eight acres of open green space
- Springfield's LARGEST playground climber and musical instruments
- Gazebo on the lake
- 2 ½ mile concrete urban trailway
- Three fishing piers
- Over 2,000 trees
- Five special garden areas

Southwind Park Partnerships

Community support of the Southwind Project continues at an overwhelming rate. In addition to financial donations, in-kind donations of time, materials and volunteer help, numerous partnerships have also been established that allow us to add many features to our entire project. Some examples of the benefits of our partners include the Sangamon County Community Foundation and the Park District being awarded grant funds from the Kellogg Foundation's "Access to Recreation" grant that finance a park-wide navigation system for our park guests. The funds will purchase three trams to transport people around the eighty acre park, GPS hand held devices that offer way finding, an educational tour of the environmental methods of energy production, emerging renewable technologies, and sustainability features included throughout the park. UIS is also partnering with us to produce the walking portion of the educational tours as well as signage throughout the park and a system for staff to communicate

with individuals that have hearing/speech challenges.

There are MANY MANY more partnerships that have allowed us to add features and contributed to the success at the park. This truly demonstrates the meaning of Springfield Community Support!
